Day 5: Clash of Titans set

It might have been just one more win for Manitoba's Jennifer Jones but it could also have been a preview of Sunday's final.

It's difficult to judge the significance of Manitoba's 8-5 win over Team Canada in the marquee game of Wednesday afternoon's draw at the Scotties Tournament of Hearts. The win kept Manitoba's record unblemished at 7-0 and knocked Heather Nedohin from the ranks of the undefeated.

"We made enough shots to win the game," said Jones. "We needed to make big shots and made them. That's always a confidence boost."

It also set the stage for a key matchup Thursday morning when Jones plays Ontario's Rachel Homan. The young Ontario skip used a 8-2, eight-end victory over Jill Shumay's slumping Saskatchewan crew to keep pace with Jones at 7-0.

The last time a rink went unbeaten at the Scotties was Linda Moore managing an 11-0 record in 1985.

In Wednesday's evening draw B.C.'s Kelly Scott kept her play-off hopes alive by stealing a 9-8 win from Suzanne Birt of P.E.I. That halted a four-game win streak for Birt. Scott and Shumay are tied at 4-3.

It wasn't so much of a surprise that Jones won but how Nedohin lost. For the first four ends the defending champion from the Saville Sports Centre in Edmonton played a conservative game, electing to keep rocks out of the house. She was forced to change her strategy after giving up a deuce in the fourth and a steal in the fifth to trail 3-1.

"I was a little surprised to see them go defensive," said Jones, the former world champion who is looking to win her fifth Scotties crown. "We like to play with lots of rocks. It's more fun. That's what curling is all about, to get some rocks in play."

Nedohin defended her game plan.

"That's how we have been playing all week," she said. "We go with the flow."

"I don't think we were overly conservative. That's a team that makes great shots. If they want to play with a bunch of rocks, I kind of like to tone it down a bit for them."

With the score 6-5, and without the hammer, Nedohin needed a steal to force an extra end. Instead Jones threw a perfect last stone to tap back Nedohin's rock and score two.

"All you can ask for is last rock coming home and hopefully a shot to win," said Jones.

Nedohin struggled at times. She curled just 69 per cent, by far her worst showing of the week.

"It wasn't my more better game," she said. "I missed two doubles by a sliver."

"She had to make her last shot."

Heading into Thursday Ontario and Manitoba lead the standings at 7-0. Nedohin sits alone at 6-1, followed by Saskatchewan and B.C. at 4-3. P.E.I. and New Brunswick are 4-4. Nova Scotia is 3-4 and Quebec 2-5. Alberta is 1-6 while Newfoundland & Labrador and NWT/Yukon are 1-7.

Homan was in control of her match against Saskatchewan so couldn't resist taking peeks at the Canada-Manitoba game on the big TV screen. The 23-year-old from Ottawa is also allowing playoff thoughts to dance in her head.

"I think maybe two more wins and we might be in the 1-2 game," she said. "That's where we would like to be at the end of the week."

In a game Scott couldn't afford to lose she found herself trailing 8-6 after eight ends. She scored two to tie in the ninth then managed the victory when Birt was heavy on a last-rock

draw.

"It was good to come away with a win from that one because I felt like we were chasing a lot throughout the game," said Scott, the 2007 world champion.

"It was a game of patience. We are never one of those teams that take the easy route."

B.C. lead Sarah Wazney has missed the last few games due to illness but is expected to return Thursday. Alternate Diane Gushulak has taken her place.

Shumay's crew have lost three in a row and things won't get any easier when they play Nedohin Thursday.

"We have to regroup and come out firing," said Shumay, who is playing in her first Hearts.

Birt defeated Kerry Galusha of NWT/Yukon 7-6 in the afternoon draw.

After taking Tuesday night off to recharge her batteries Alberta's Kristie Moore returned as skip and guided her team to a 9-3 win over Galusha. It was Alberta's first win of the week.

"That's what happens when you make all your shots, you have confidence and you're ready to rock and roll," said Moore. "They didn't challenge us as much as we had been challenged before."

Moore watched Renee Sonnenberg skip Tuesday night and said the break paid huge dividends.

"I was mentally exhausted," he said. "I was trying to do too much out there. You can't do it all by yourself."

In other games Wednesday night Mary-Anne Arsenault of Nova Scotia scored a 7-6, extra end victory over Stacie Devereaux of Newfoundland & Labrador while Andrea Crawford of New Brunswick doubled Allison Ross of Quebec 8-4.

Curling world mourns loss of Arleen Day

The untimely death of one of Canada's longest-serving curling officials was mourned back in early September.

A former Saskatchewan women's curling champion, 63-year-old Arleen Day of Regina died of complications from lung cancer on Sept. 4. She was diagnosed with the disease in 2010.

Day was tremendously popular among fellow Canadian Curling Association fellow officials, also nation-wide competitors and the media.

Her approach as an official was “straight-ahead, no-nonsense” — combined with a heart of gold and a dry sense of humour that was downright addictive. She attained Level 5 status, the highest tier one can reach in terms of officiating.

Day skipped Saskatchewan to a third-place finish at the 1982 Scott Tournament of Hearts in her hometown, losing the semi to eventual champion Colleen Jones.

In fact, Day's team and four others wound up snarled with 7-3 records following the round-robin segment of the first Scott-sponsored tournament. In sudden-death playoffs, Day eliminated Cathy Shaw of Alberta while Dorothy Rose of Manitoba sidelined Barbara Parker of Comox, B.C. Day then lost to Jones who defeated Rose in the championship final.

Day's officiating national career as an umpire was close to unparalleled. Her first assignment was the 1989 junior nationals. Among her last, fittingly, was as an umpire for the 2010 Winter Olympics tournament in Vancouver. But she actually began officiating at the provincial level as early as 1983.

She moved into the technical side of curling full-tilt after a serious car crash in 1986 ended her competitive playing career. She was a Level 2 coach and became involved in curling on the administrative side. She played numerous roles, including president and head official of the Sas-



katchewan Ladies Curling Association. She assisted with the amalgamation of the Canadian Ladies Curling Association and the Canadian Curling Association in 1990.

She also helped develop the Canadian curling officiating system and served on the CCA officiating committee while instructing students and adults in officiating and how-to-play clinics throughout Saskatchewan.

She served as the head official for the international Continental Cup competition since its inception in Regina in 2002. She missed the 2010 edition due to her illness but was back as chief arbiter at Langley, B.C. last season.

She was presented with the CCA award of achievement in 1997 and was an honorary life member of the SCA. In 2011, she was inducted into the Regina Sports Hall Of Fame as a builder.

"It still gives me goose bumps; it's something I'll never forget," Day told Greg Harder of the Regina Leader-Post prior to her induction. "I've been very, very fortunate. I certainly never ever thought I would reach the levels that I have but it came along and I reached for it and I got it. It's something you dream of but never expect to reach.

“When one door closes another opens. Close to the end of my competitive curling, Ronda Wood encouraged me to give back to the sport I loved by officiating. Through her mentorship and encouragement I was able to develop a new skill that I feel has helped to better the game and expand my horizons as a person and cheerleader of curling as a Sport. Hopefully, I have helped to encourage others who love the sport as much as I do.”

Day admitted she'd rather be throwing rocks than officiating.

"It's apples and oranges now to then," she said. "I only wish the ice and stones that they're playing with now were available in '82. I was an all-star skip at 77 per cent and if a skip is 77 per cent now she's at the bottom of the pack.

"But still enjoy it (officiating as opposed to playing) because you're in contact with the players and they're wonderful to be around. I wouldn't do it if I didn't enjoy it.

"I'm not sure that many of the curlers know that I've also played in Tournament Of Hearts but that's OK. If you want people's respect you have to earn it. I've been around most of these ladies for long enough that they can handle my decisions and respect me for them."

Rocks and pucks: Not that different

About 600 kilometres separate Kingston from Washington, D.C., but that distance hasn't severed the bond between Taryn Holtby and her brother Braden.

"She's probably the smartest person I ever met," Braden said in a telephone interview. "She's the hardest working person I've ever met in my life."

Taryn, a veterinarian in Lloydminster, choked back a tear when told of Braden's words.


"I wouldn't give him up for anything," she said. "I love him to death."

Taryn, 24, is 14 months older and about a foot shorter than Braden. Even while growing up on a farm in Marshall, Sask., the two were close.

"They did everything together," said mother Tami Holtby, who has been attending the Scotties all week. "They really were best friends."

"They still are today."

In Washington, Braden is sneaking down to the Capitals training facility to watch games.

"We unfortunately were on the road for the first few days," he said. "I was checking for live updates and the scores."

"Sometimes it's fairly simple," said Taryn. "Sometimes it's a pretty darn good speech."

Braden said the two have talked.

"I've congratulated her after a game," he said. "I don't want to be too much of a hassle. She has enough going on in her mind already."

As a teenager Braden curled in high school and with he 4-H Club.

"I was a third," he said. "I liked to throw the rocks hard."

"It wasn't quite my sport"

On the surface ice seems to be the only thing curling and hockey have in common, but Braden said many of the mental strengths a goaltender needs also apply to curling.

"Curling is definitely a mental sport," he said. "There is a lot of pressure because you know the type of shots you have to make. That puts on a lot of stress."

"That has a lot to do with your mentally ability"

As a teenager Taryn tried to glean all the information she could from the goaltender coaches and sports physiologists who worked with Braden.

"She was always interested in that," he said. "She quizzed me to get information. She is a student of everything. She loves to learn."

During times when Braden struggled with his career it was Taryn who would offer comfort and advice.

"She was always there with my parents to support me through games," he said. "I would get very down after games if I played bad."

"She was always there to cheer me up. That part was something she probably doesn't realize. She helped me a lot."

"They knew a lot of what happens between themselves," she said. "I know he would talk to her."

"I don't know what she said to him. It seemed to help all the time."

Taryn said the support went both ways. Braden was always there

"He knew what to say," she said. "He didn't sugarcoat it."

"He would pick me up, say what you did good and bring back a

He would pick me up, say what you did good and bring back confidence. A brother knows what to say."

UNITED STATES NATIONALS WRAP-UP • GREEN BAY, WISCONSIN

Brown, Clark to represent U.S.A.

The United States has decided its representatives at the upcoming world championships in Riga, Latvia (women) and Victoria, B.C. (men), on the frozen, non-tundra, not far from Lambeau Field in Green Bay, Wisconsin over the weekend.

On the men's side, Seattle, Washington's Brady Clark outduelled some of the field favourites to earn the berth to Victoria. Ironically, Clark could very well be the curler who has to travel the least distance to get there – via ferry.

The 35-year-old skipper is a Grand Forks, N.D. native, and his third is Sean Beighton, a Seattle product.

Enter the Canadian flavour.

Second on the club is Darren Lehto, an Athabasca, Alta., product, while lead Phil Tilker is from Bracebridge, Ont.

The team reeled off five wins in a row, then turned around and dropped four straight.

But they would not lose again.

They beat Madison, Wisconsin's Craig Brown twice in a row to get to the Page playoffs, where he knocked off defending U.S. champ Heath McCormick, who plays out of New York, but lives in Sarnia, Ont.

Duluth, Minnesota's John Shuster was his opponent in the semi-finals, and Clark etched out a 6-5 win,

and then matched that score in the final over another Duluth crew – Tyler George.

Clark looked to be in control of the final leading 4-2 in the eighth, but gave up a three, to trail 5-4. But he blanked the ninth and scored a deuce in 10 to grab the title.

On the women's side of the draw, a familiar face returns – also with Canuck flavour.

Erica Brown's Madison, Wisconsin crew returns to the worlds in Riga, reprising the role they had in Swift Current, Sask., three years ago.

Brown, from Oakville, Ont., and her crew of third Deb McCormick (Saskatoon, Sask.), second Jessica Schultz, who hails from Anchorage, Ak., and lead Ann Swisshelm (Middletown, Ohio) led the way in the round-robin and beat defending champ Allison Pottinger in the Page 1-2 game. In an interesting contest, Brown had a late 7-4 lead, but Pottinger scored a deuce and a single to tie it, forcing Brown to score one for the win.

She then beat Duluth's Courtney George, again up two late and gave up a single and a steal, but used hammer in and extra end to secure victory 7-6.

"It's fantastic," she said. "You hear about lots of sibling rivalries, or siblings that don't get along. It was never like that."

Braden does have one complaint about his sister.

"I don't know how she can be so nice all the time," he laughed. "It used to frustrate me when we were growing up."

"She would never get mad at anyone. It taught me a lot about how to live your life. The attitude she had all the time, she was so positive."

Said World Curling Federation president Kate Caithness of Scotland: "The curling world has lost a great friend. Arleen devoted her life to our sport. She will be remembered not only as a competitive curler but also as a top class Canadian and international curling official."

Seven-time Saskatchewan champion skip Michelle Englot, who grew to know Day as a player and as an official and was the alternate player with Day as the coach with Regina's Kathy Fahlman at the 1987 Scott Tournaments of Hearts, told Murray McCormick of the Leader-Post:

"She (Day) will be missed. She was part of a whole group of curlers who were instrumental in helping young curlers like me get started. Even though she was a hard-ass, everybody knew she was doing it for the good of the sport. She had an unbelievable sense of humour, which you got to know when you were playing right beside her while she was officiating."

Added Regina's Amber Holland, the 2011 Canadian women's champion and the current executive-director of the Saskatchewan Curling Association:

"She was one of those people in curling who did everything. She was president of the ladies' curling association and obviously curled, but officiating was the highlight for her. She took that so seriously for a volunteer position."

"You have some volunteers who do a great job, but it was Arleen's job when she did it. She made it known that she had one expectation about what should be done and how it should be done right. She was classy in the way that you wouldn't think of in terms of classy. She wasn't dinner-party classy, but classy in the way that she handled herself."
